Chapelgate Christian Academy (CCA) is a ministry of the Chapelgate Presbyterian Church in Marriottsville, Maryland. CCA is a Christian school that offers high academic and spiritual standards with a student body that is made up of students from around the world.

Mission Statement

CCA exists to provide academic excellence in a Gospel-centered environment, inspiring and equipping students in knowledge, passion, and faith.

Vision Statement

CCA has been established to prepare students to glorify God as life-long stewards through creative, critical, and biblical thinking, influencing culture, and serving others.

The International Student Program

Chapelgate Christian Academy welcomes students from all over the world. Our ESL classes at CCA give international students the opportunity to hone their English skills in a warm, welcoming environment. After ESL classes have been completed, they will join regular classes in subsequent years where they will be challenged academically as they prepare for college. They have the option to be placed in American families through our Home Stay Program, live with relatives or other contacts, or partner with an agency. We recommend they live with American families where they will get first-hand experience in practicing and improving their English skills and which offer your student extraordinary opportunities to learn more about American culture. Many students are eager to share their own customs and culture with their host families, providing a rich environment of learning and sharing.

Handbook for International Families and Students

The purpose of this handbook is to provide **additional** information for international students and their families. International students and their families need to be familiar with the *CCA Parent-Student Handbook* also as there is much information in there that will apply to all students, American and international.

The first section of this addendum will address the issues that international families need to know to apply to CCA and successfully begin the school year. The second part informs new international students and their families with what they need to know and do to have a successful experience at CCA.



International Family Information for Admissions

Admissions

International students applying for admission to CCA must submit all required documents on the International Student Application Checklist. These documents will include copies of the following:

- Copy of passport.
- For high school: Copy of an official TOEFL score report from a certified test center <u>Duolingo English test report</u>.
- Copy of a Certificate of Deposit demonstrating the family's ability to provide tuition and living expenses while their student is attending CCA.
- Immunization record showing immunizations required by the State of Maryland. Without these immunizations the student may not be able to attend class until we have the documentation that they have been inoculated. This must be completed and will be at the family's expense with a \$250 administrative fee if it is necessary for a CCA staff member to take your student.
- Visa, upon acceptance to CCA.
- A signed and notarized medical release and power of attorney (POA), upon acceptance to CCA.

Prospective international students will have a video interview with the head of school or a school administrator. A picture ID must be provided to CCA before the interview.

All new international students will a language test like TOEFL or Duolingo English at CCA supervised by CCA personnel during international orientation. The main purpose of this test is to help with placement in the proper classes. If, after arriving, it becomes apparent that the student's English proficiency is too weak to be successful at CCA, and the English level doesn't reflect what was presented during the application process, the student may be dismissed from CCA. Our program is designed for advanced ESL students, and we are not equipped to assist lower skilled students. We have found lower skilled students to be at a significant disadvantage, not only in class, but also in adjusting to life in the US. If a student is dismissed from CCA, the parents are responsible to pay the tuition through the end of the semester as well as the return airfare.



Placement in High School Classes

All new international students will be placed in:

- ESL English (until such time as it is determined that they will be successful in our regular English classes).
- ESL US History
- Bible for International Students.
- Physical Science for exposure to English vocabulary in the sciences (for 9th and 10th graders).

Most international students will enroll in ESL classes. International students who have not had Bible in the US must enroll in International Bible even if they do not take the other ESL classes. Since they are fluent in their native language, international students do not need to take foreign language as a graduation requirement; they are certainly welcome to do so if they would like. They can choose elective courses to fulfill graduation requirements.

Sometimes students need additional help. Learning a new language is difficult, and we carefully monitor grades and talk to teachers about how students are progressing. If we contact you about getting additional tutoring for your student, please understand that it's because we are looking ahead for long-term success for your student. It's much easier to get tutoring early rather than waiting until your student is so far behind that they become discouraged. Once you've been notified, you must authorize and fund the tutoring within 2 weeks. You're free to find a tutor in the community but we prefer to use CCA tutors who have easy access to teachers and know how our system works.

If your student has below a C for a final grade in ESL English, he/she will not be able to take regular English in the next school year without additional tutoring. If 2 or more of their final ESL grades are C or below, they must also have additional tutoring for the beginning of the next school year. This tutoring must start the first week of school and continue until all grades are at the C level.



Suggested Schedules for 1st year international students

Because international students have transferred from schools overseas, it may be necessary for the school counseling office to execute changes from these suggested schedules in order for them to graduate on time.

9th – 10th Grade ESL

ESL English ESL US History International Bible Physical Science Study Hall Math as indicated by placement testing Elective

11th Grade ESL

Transcripts

International students in grade 9 will start a high school transcript in grade 9 from CCA, even though the student may have already completed 9th grade elsewhere. Previous grades or credits from any complete 9th grade courses taken outside of the United States will not be used on the CCA transcript.

International students in grades 10, 11, and 12 will have all grades from high school years recorded on the CCA high school transcript even if there are multiple years in one grade.



Homestays

We encourage our international students to experience life with an American family. This is the best and quickest way to learn English. If your student would be interested in this experience, there are three options:

- 1. Indicate on your application that you're interested in participating in the CCA Home Stay Program.
- 2. Use an agency that would place your student in a family the agency has chosen.
- 3. Find a home through your family and friends in the United States.

Please understand that if you choose 2 or 3 we will not be able to assist you if there are problems in your student's homestay until those business relationships are severed. Please be sure to carefully check where your child will be staying. In our program, we do background checks and home visits plus talk to the student biweekly to make certain that they are healthy and happy.

Also, please understand the following:

- In Maryland, smoking, *including vaping*, is illegal for anyone under 21. If your student is a cigarette smoker, please understand that it can be very difficult to find American families who will take smokers. In our homestay program, we cannot guarantee placement for smokers. If it is discovered that your student is smoking after they are placed in a home in the CCA homestay program and the host family requests a change, your student will be moved to another home. If we are not able to place them, then you will need to find other living arrangements. Regardless of living arrangements, the student will still be responsible for the semester's tuition.
- If your student will be older than the typical American high school student and is being placed in an American homestay, please understand that homestay parents will expect your student to follow their expectations and curfews typical of American high school students.
- Many international students are surprised to find that there is limited public transportation in many parts of the US. The area around CCA is no exception, and they will have to rely on the adults with whom they live or use taxi services.

All international students must keep CCA's Admissions Office informed regarding the current location of their physical residence and contact information for their families or guardians. If an international student moves from one location to another, the Admissions Office must be informed immediately because this information has to be reported to SEVIS as required by the United States government.



Information for a successful transition

Attendance

At CCA, we realize that there's much education happening in the classroom which can't be made up from home. All students are expected to attend school from the first school day to the last scheduled day of their final exams for high school as indicated on the school calendar. Please make travel arrangements for your student to arrive in the United States a few days BEFORE the first scheduled day of classes and to leave the United States AFTER the last scheduled final exam day for high school. Any school days missed, especially during exams, could adversely affect your student's grades and their GPA.

- Newly accepted international students are expected to report to CCA for International Student Orientation when they will take a language placement exam and other placement tests as well as be introduced to the culture of CCA and the United States. Students who fail to report for these tests on the assigned days may be assessed a fee of \$100 to make up the exam at a later date and may not be given a class schedule until they complete the placement exams. Returning students are expected to report to CCA on the first day of school as indicated on the school calendar. Failure to report to classes on the first day may result in the student receiving a zero (0) for all work missed (e.g. classwork, homework assignments, quizzes, tests, etc.).
- Every other year, the entire high school attends a high school retreat offcampus. This is mandatory, and all high school students are expected to attend. The cost for this retreat is included in tuition. Teachers get to know students, which is invaluable when it is time for them to write teacher recommendations for college admissions.
- Students leaving prior to the completion of their course work and exams will receive a zero (0) for each assignment, project, test, quiz and exam missed. The zeros will be calculated in the fourth quarter and second semester as well as the midterm average and final grade. Students granted "special exception" to this policy are required to provide a written explanation validating the exception from a parent, guardian or agent representing that student *4 weeks prior to the start of midterm* or final and will be assessed an administration fee of \$250 per class that must be paid prior to receiving midterm and final exams. Exam dates are posted on the calendar on the website.
- Each student is allowed 14 days of absences in every class. These can be used for anything such as sickness, appointments, or travel. If a student misses more than 14 days in a class, their final grade will be reduced by one half of a percentage point (0.5%) for each day over 14 missed. For example if a student has missed 20 days in a class, and has a 90 as a final grade, his/her grade will be reduced by 3 points to an 87. The 87 will show on their transcript



Dress Code

Please review the dress code portion of the *Parent-Student CCA Handbook*. Significant changes have been made to the dress code this year.

Oftentimes, international students receive so much information about their new school that it may be difficult to comprehend and prepare for all of the necessary requirements. Students are responsible for purchasing and wearing clothing items that meet the requirements. Ask in the office or email the Director of International Students if there are any questions about the dress code policy.

Finances

Families may pay their tuition, materials fees, and CCA Homestay Program costs by wire, credit card or personal check drawn on a US bank. Our bank does not take payments from apps like Zelle or Venmo for security reasons. For wires and credit cards there will be an additional fee. For more information about paying fees, please refer to the *CCA Parent-Student Handbook*.

Some parents have asked us what kinds of expenses their student will have besides tuition, room and board. One ongoing expense a student may have is if they choose to buy lunch at Chapelgate. They will have an account through LunchTime https://schoolpaymentportal.com/Default.aspx and will access their account using their access card. Any balance will rollover year to year but any balance remaining when a student leaves Chapelgate is non-refundable.

Other extra expenses the students may have to cover include purchasing school uniforms, school supplies, senior class activities, money for social activities, school clubs, or food when they go out with school clubs or friends. They will not have to pay for books, sports, retreats or other school fees. If you have any questions about this, please don't hesitate to contact us. They should have access to money if they need to go to the doctor since most *doctors want to be paid first. The insurance will then reimburse your student*. This will also be the case for prescriptions and dental and eye needs.

Student Insurance

Accident and sickness insurance is provided by CCA for each international student. Your student will receive a card at the beginning of the school year. The website is <u>https://www.imglobal.com/member/login</u>. There you will find information about the plan as well as claim forms. If your student loses his/her card, they'll be able to get a replacement from the website.

In the US, doctor fees are paid first, your student will send in a claim, and the insurance will reimburse.



Transferring

When international students plan to transfer to another school, they must provide the Admissions Office with a copy of an official letter of acceptance at the new school (or college or university for students who are graduating). The Admissions Office will then use the SEVIS system to transfer the student's I-20 to the new school (or college or university). Once the I-20 has been transferred out of CCA, it becomes the responsibility of the new school (or college or university) to issue a new I-20 to the student for the purpose of re-entry to the United States in order to attend the new school (or college or university). Students may not leave the United States and return using the I-20 from CCA when they will be attending a different school (or college or university)

Withdrawing from Chapelgate

When it is necessary for a student to withdraw from CCA, the student must notify the Admissions Office and the Director of International Student Programs. Please note that Chapelgate does not reimburse tuition and does not give half-credit for any classes. Transcripts will be withheld until all financial obligations are satisfied. Depending on the circumstances, withdrawal can affect the student's I-20 status. Any balance on their LunchTime account is not refundable.

Use of Technology

High school students will need a device to access Wi-Fi for some classes. These can be purchased in your home country or here in the US.

- Students may not use translators for tests, quizzes, or other assessments as indicated by the teachers.
- Students **may not** use their cell phones during school for any purpose unless the teacher gives them permission.

Expectations for International Students

Overview

The International Students and Families Handbook is intended to act as a supplement to the Chapelgate Christian Academy Parent-Student Handbook.

Academic

Academic Expectations for Students

- Student will obtain and maintain grades appropriate for their skill level.
- Students will present their own work when testing or turning in reports or projects.
- Students will request help when they are in need of assistance.
- Students will act in a moral and ethical manner by presenting only their own work when submitting homework, research, reports, or taking tests.
- Students will act in a responsible and appropriate manner in class that will enhance the learning environment.
- Students will speak in English in the classroom, in the Media Center, and in the lunch line.

Testing

All first year international students are required to take the a language placement test, once in the fall and once in the spring, which is administered by CCA. This testing helps us with academic placement.

School Activities

All students are encouraged to participate in extracurricular activities including sports. International students are attending Chapelgate Christian Academy to experience the opportunities American schools have to offer. Extracurricular activities are part of that experience, and we encourage students to use the opportunity to participate if at all possible. For new international students, our recommendation is that students limit their participation in extracurricular activities for the first semester as they make the adjustment to American life.



Additional Program Expectations

- Students will treat all persons with respect and acceptance.
- Students will use appropriate language free of critical or derogatory remarks, swearing, and inappropriate sexual talk.
- Students will respect and support school staff, community, or other individuals/groups.
- Students will not cheat, lie, or steal.
- Students will act in a cooperative manner to achieve personal and school goals.
- Students will not engage in any sexual immorality.
- Students will obey all expectations set by Chapelgate Christian Academy.
- Students will refrain from public displays of affection.
